A Bat Mitzvah in Our Community

On November 5, Hannah Lewis will become a Bat Mitzvah at Tzedek v'Shalom. I am excited to welcome her as an adult member of our community, and to celebrate with her family and our whole community.

Our whole community. Yes, when any child becomes a Bat or Bar Mitzvah, a “daughter/son of the commandments,” it is a *simcha*, a cause for celebration for the whole congregation. It isn't just a family affair.

Our entire community raises each and every child to become the Jewish person that they are — we educate them, we are role models for them, and our mission and values as a congregation inform how they experience Judaism and what they believe Judaism stands for in the world. Each child's family shapes their Jewish development as well, but one person or family cannot be Jewish without community. Simply put, *community is an essential aspect of being Jewish*.

Back in the day, a Bar Mitzvah (as only men were counted in a *minyan*, or prayer quorum) would simply come up to the Torah for an *aliyah* to recite a Torah blessing on behalf of the congregation. Since only adults can have this honor, that special *aliyah* signified that this person had now reached the age of majority and could be counted and depended upon for a *minyan* and to fulfill *mitzvot* incumbent upon adults, like fast-

ing on Yom Kippur. It didn't mean that the 13-year-old was considered a full adult in every way, but rather had reached the age where he must take responsibility for his spiritual life and growth.

In recent decades, Bar — and now Bat — Mitzvah has become a much bigger deal. Students are expected to read significant portions of Torah and Haftarah, share their thoughts on the Torah portion, do a mitzvah project, and lead as much of the service as they can. I believe that this development in many ways is a good and necessary thing, as long as the process of preparation is spiritually meaningful and does not put undue pressure on the child.

But another trend has developed that I think is not so good. The Shabbat morning service at which the Bar or Bat Mitzvah comes up for that all-important *aliyah* has become a service that is increasingly centered around the child and his/her family. In itself, that is fine and good, but not when it comes at the expense of the needs and traditions of the rest of the congregation. Tzedek v'Shalom is not alone in experiencing this trend, and each congregation has their own challenges. One issue might be how to deal with large groups of unaccompanied teenage friends of the Bar/Bat Mitzvah, many of whom may not be familiar with Hebrew



prayers or know how to conduct themselves at a Jewish service. Another issue is to what degree a family dictates the length and content of the service, and who receives various honors, like aliyot and readings. This may not seem like a big deal at TvS, but in other congregations where there is a Bar or Bat Mitzvah almost every week, it is a real concern.

One thing that is a specific issue at Tzedek v'Shalom is one that, thankfully, I think can be easily addressed, and that is congregational attendance at Bar and Bat Mitzvah services. There is a grievous misapprehension that Bar and Bat Mitzvah services are "by invitation only." I'm not sure how this idea developed, but let me say emphatically that as with all TvS services, EVERYONE is welcome and encouraged to attend services this Shabbat and every occasion where a young person become a Bar or Bat Mitzvah in our community. In addition to their being beautiful ways to celebrate Shabbat, they are really wonderful opportunities to witness how a young person has grown and developed in spiritual leadership and to hear their unique perspective on how they find meaning in Torah and Jewish life. They are full of joy and promise, and even when you don't personally know the family, you can reap the celebration and the feeling of accomplishment.

So please come to services on November 5 and share in the *nachas* of the Lewis family as together we lift Hannah into the realm of Jewish adulthood in our unique community.

Our school is settling into a new year — despite having to cancel snow on the last Sunday in October because of SNOW!

Our school handbook contains lots of information about our school. The following are just brief examples: **Our Mission Statement:** Tzedek v'Shalom hopes to foster a lifelong love of Jewish learning and a sense of belonging to the Jewish people. We seek challenging and creative education that illuminates the relevance of Judaism to our lives. Every child is known and valued in our community. [We set our Mission Statement even before we started our school!]

The Three B's: Belonging, Behaving, Believing and our School Model

Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan, the founder of Reconstructionist Judaism, suggested that being a member of the Jewish community is about belonging and behaving before it is about believing. According to him, one does not (and perhaps cannot) be strongly connected to core Jewish beliefs and perspectives without first having a sense of belonging to the community. Therefore, our Religious School is modeled around a child's introduction and journey through Judaism, maturing through the three cognitive levels religious identification, what Rabbi Kaplan called the three B's: Belonging, Behaving, and Believing.

Along this journey, the child matures from Bonim (Builder) to Giborim (Hero) to Dayanim (Judge), at which point they are ready to take on the responsibilities of a Jewish adult as a Bar or Bat Mitzvah.



Pumpkin Challah

In Maggie Glezer's baking book [The Blessing of Bread](#) she writes that pumpkin challah — a.k.a. pan de calabaza — is a [Sephardic](#) specialty imbued with deep meaning. Like other foods made with pumpkin, it represents the hope that God will protect the Jewish people just as the pumpkin's thick shell protects the flesh inside.

Sephardic Jews traditionally serve this bread during [Rosh Hashanah](#), when eating auspicious, symbolic foods is especially popular. Still, it is equally delicious served on any cold autumn or winter Shabbat when the added heartiness and kick of spice can be fully appreciated.

Ingredients

1 package yeast (7g)	3-3/4 cups unbleached flour
2/3 cup warm water	1/2 cup pureed pumpkin
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon	1/4 cup canola oil
1/2 teaspoon ground cardamom	1 egg (+1 egg for glaze)
1/3 cups sugar	1-1/2 teaspoon salt

1. Sprinkle yeast into a small bowl and pour the warm water on it. Let stand for 10 minutes, then stir to dissolve.
2. Mix flour, cinnamon, and cardamom in a large bowl. Make a well in the center and pour in yeast/water mixture. Using a wooden spoon, incorporate some of the flour into the water — just enough to form a soft paste. (Don't try to completely incorporate — there should be quite a bit of dry flour left at this point.) Cover bowl with a towel and leave until frothy and risen, about 20 minutes.
3. In a separate bowl, whisk together the sugar, pumpkin, oil, egg, and salt. Add to the risen flour mixture and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface and knead for 5–10 minutes until the dough is pliable. (If it's too wet, keep adding flour in small amounts.)
4. Let dough rest 2–3 minutes. Meanwhile, lightly oil the bowl, put the dough in it and re-cover with the towel. Let dough rise in a warm place until it has tripled in size, 2–3 hours. Punch down dough, knead it a bit more, and cut it into two equal pieces. Cut each of the two pieces into three equal pieces (You should have 6 total pieces at this point). Roll each piece into a straight rope. Braid three ropes together and repeat so that you end up with two braided loaves.
5. Sprinkle baking sheets with a little cornmeal, or line them with parchment paper. Place loaves on the sheets, cover, and let rise until doubled in size, about 40 minutes. Glaze loaves with extra beaten egg.
6. Bake at 350° F for about 40 minutes, or until golden brown.
