FROM RABBI ANNA BOSWELL-LEVY...

WALKING HAND IN HAND

I recently saw a segment with Katie Couric in which she and others were considering the stories the media covered in the past year. She reflected, "The bigotry expressed against Muslims in this country has been one of the most disturbing stories to surface" in which saw a saw "a seething hatred many people feel for all Muslims." She theorized that this disturbing media narrative could be remedied by another, more lighthearted narrative: "Maybe we need a Muslim version of The

Cosby Show." The Muslim Cosby Show might help people learn about Islam, because "people are afraid of what they don't understand."

How does a religion become understood and accepted by America? How does it become "American?" And, how can it do it in a meaningful and deep way so that it does not lose its distinctive wisdom and nature? We might look at how we Jews were able to do it, to

the extent that we have.

In 1955, the conservative Jewish thinker Will Herberg wrote the book *Protestant-Catholic-Jew* in which he argued that these three religions formed a tripartite as the quintessential American religions in that they were "religions of democracy." Herberg recognized that in the diffuse, mobile structure of American society, religion functioned more as a means of "self-identification and social location," but he warned that these religions should be wary of affirming the "American Way of Life" above their own distinctive wisdom and values.

Herberg wrote at a time when American Jews were still reeling from the effects of the Holocaust — it wasn't yet even acceptable to talk about it, and Jews were deeply afraid of the spread of anti-Semitism in the United States. They took hold of the American dream and became rapidly upwardly mobile. They moved to the suburbs, where they joined large suburban synagogues and created JCCs. And, they aggressively distanced themselves from any person or movement that smacked of communism, which was perceived (and still is) as the greatest threat to American way of life. They made every effort to demonstrate how very American Judaism was.

Today it is Islam that faces the challenge of greater acceptance, and I think Herberg, had he lived to see the growth of Islam in America, would have encouraged its "Americanization" as it is being developed by groups like the American Society for Muslim Advancement, founded by Imam Feisal Abdul Rauf and his wife Daisy Khan. When they conceived of the Park51 Islamic community center to be built in lower Manhattan, they were inspired by the successful JCC model and were guided in their efforts by Rabbi Joy Levitt, the director of the 92nd Street Y.

All these centers — the YMCAs, the JCCs, and the Park51 center, were designed to be places people could go to socialize, learn, play, and even pray. Without having to spell it out, these community centers are rooted in the idea of religious "peoplehood" — the people's unique expressions, creativity, spirituality, and relationships. What makes these centers uniquely American is their democratizing structure and nature — they are by the people, and for the people.

It is this sort of "Americanization" of religion that we must strongly encourage and support, especially in the face of extremism and phobia today. Islamic extremism does exist (as there are radical, extremist elements in every religion) and therefore we need to encourage moderate and progressive Muslim voices when they courageously express themselves here in

this country. We must also acknowledge our grave lack of knowledge and fear about Islam and combat it by educating ourselves and forming bonds of friendship between our faith communities. This is the first step to combating the insidious forces of Islamophobia and bigotry that have revealed themselves in the wake of the proposal to build an Islamic center in New York.

Contrary to those who would oppose the building of the center, I believe that the existence of such a center strengthens the ideals of American democracy. We Jews who have struggled to gain acceptance here must continue to serve as models for other peoples trying to find an authentic American expression of their own and we must not become complacent in defending them when they become the target of the bigotry of the day.

On Sunday, January 16th, Daisy Khan will be speaking in Philadelphia as part of the Neighborhood Interfaith Movement's annual Martin Luther King Jr. celebration, which this year is entitled "We'll Walk Hand in Hand." She spoke recently at the Rabbis for Human Rights conference in New York, and her voice is powerful and humble and inspiring. Please join me and other TvS members as we join with congregations across Philadelphia to hear her speak! I cannot think of a better way to start 2011, remembering and furthering Dr. King's message of civil liberty and freedom for all Americans.

Together may we bring in a more peaceful, righteous, and prosperous New Year!

Ordained by Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi as a Rabbinic Pastor, he is completing a program of Rabbinical Ordination at the Academy for Jewish Religion, in Riverdale, NY, and is the author of *Jewish Views of the Afterlife*.

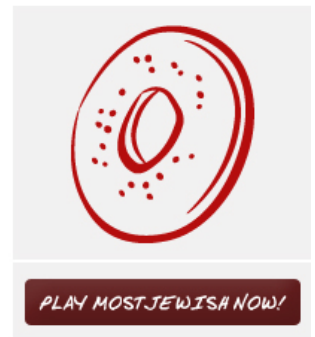

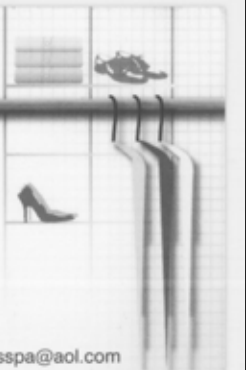
